Harvest assembly and supporting the local rotary club

As part of our in-school assembly routines, we will celebrate harvest next Friday 29th September.

(NB this is just for the children and staff. In the past Year 5 have led a harvest service, but are leading a Remembrance service instead, on the 10th of November in the church at 10a.m.)

We will give thanks for all that we have and seek to support those who have little.

For over twenty years many Sutton schools have generously supported our Rotary Club's international work by donating harvest produce which we have arranged to be distributed to orphanages and other needy causes in Romania.

Carshalton Park Rotary Club was formed two years ago by merging Carshalton Beeches and Carshalton Rotary clubs. As part of Rotary International, the world's largest service organisation, we will once again be donating school's harvest produce to The Romanian Aid Foundation (RoAF) Harvest Appeal in support of families in real need especially those who have no land and no work. No

work means no income which in turn leaves them without the ability to pay for essentials such as food, heating and accommodation.

If you would like to support this programme by donating the children's harvest festival service gifts on Friday 29th September, the Rotary volunteers undertake to collect the produce on the day of the service and arrange for it to be transported to RoAF's storage and distribution facilities.

For those who wish to bring a donation for this cause, the items most in need are: pasta shapes, spaghetti, rice, flour; tinned fruit and vegetables (except potatoes); tinned meat and fish such as ham, tuna or sardines; meat and fish pastes, sandwich spreads, jam; biscuits (sweet and savoury); cooking sauces, mayonnaise, ketchup; sugar, coffee (not tea), milk powder, cooking oil; condiments, instant potato, tinned or packet soups.

Reminders

<u>Lateness in the morning and at pick-up</u> Every minute of the day is carefully planned to maximise learning opportunities. Please make sure that children arrive at school on time. There are children who are also persistently late being picked up. Parents will now be sent a warning letter if their child is collected after 3.45pm. After three warning letters, reminding of the system, a fine of £5 will be charged to parents on ParentPay. This will offset staff supervision costs.

LOST PROPERTY Please name all of your children's belongings and come in and look for items your child has lost before or after school—located in the corridor outside Elm class

<u>Illness</u>: Please remember that if children are ill with sickness or diarrhoea they must not return to school until 48 hours after ceasing to have these symptoms. We are also reminding children about the importance of hand washing. Thank you for your co-operation.

IMPORTANT: medicines must not be sent into school with children under any circumstances. If your child needs to take medicine during the day, please bring it to the office with a completed medicine form. This form can be downloaded from our website or obtained from the office.

NUTS—please note that nuts should not be sent in to school under any circumstances since we have children who are very sensitive to them and can have severe allergic reactions.

Healthy snacks—please can children bring only fruit for snacks at play time. Thank you.
